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THE MONTH OF DECEMBER:

December is the 12th month (and last month) in our modern-day Gregorian calendar (as it was in the preceding Julian calendar).

However, it was originally the 10th month of the Roman calendar (until 153 BC). Hence, "December" comes from the Latin decem, meaning "ten."

In Roman times, the calendar only had ten months and began with March! The winter period was not even assigned months because it was not an active time for military, agriculture, or civil life.

The month of December originally consisted of 30 days. When January and February were added to the calendar (around 700 BCE), December was shortened to 29 days. Then, two days were added to December in the subsequent Julian calendar, making it 31 days long.

December 2023 Calendar

December 3 is the <u>First Sunday of Advent</u>, marking the beginning of the Advent season.

December 6 is <u>Saint Nicholas Day</u>. St. Nicholas, the patron saint of children, inspires traditions around the world, from hunts for presents to stockings or shoes filled with sweets.

December 7 is <u>National Pearl Harbor Remembrance</u> Day, and it marks the beginning of Hanukkah.

December 13 is <u>St. Lucia's Day</u>, which has long been associated with festivals of light. Before the Gregorian calendar reform in 1752, her feast day occurred on the shortest day of the year (hence the saying "Lucy light, Lucy light, shortest day and longest night").

December 15 is Bill of Rights Day.

December 17 is Wright Brothers Day.

December 21 is the <u>Winter Solstice</u>—the astronomical first day of winter in the Northern Hemisphere and first day of summer in the Southern Hemisphere.

December 25 is <u>Christmas Day</u>, a Christian holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. Learn more about <u>American Christmas traditions</u>.

December 26 is <u>Boxing Day</u> (Canada, UK) and the first day of <u>Kwanzaa</u>.

On the last evening of the year, December 31, kiss Page 12 the person you hope to keep kissing!

Odd Moments This Month in History

December 14, 1807: Space Invader

At 6:30 a.m. on this day in 1807, residents from Vermont to Connecticut looked up at the sky and saw a red fireball. About two-thirds the size of a full Moon, it raced across the heavens, broke apart, and fell to earth in at least six areas of Weston (now Easton), Trumbull, and Fairfield, Connecticut. Whizzing sounds were heard close to the impact sites, and three sonic booms were heard as far as 40 miles away. The entire event took about 30 seconds.

Upon hearing the news a few days later, Yale professor Benjamin Silliman, accompanied by his colleague, professor James Kingsley, traveled to the impact area to talk to witnesses, examine impact sites, and collect specimens (including some that enterprising townsfolk were selling as souvenirs). Silliman confirmed that it had been a meteorite—the first officially recorded in the New World.

Meteorites, rocks that fell from space, were a concept slowly gaining acceptance in Europe, but their study was still a relatively new science. In an article in the Connecticut Herald published on December 29, Silliman and Kingsley described the Weston event. The news rapidly spread to other newspapers, and accounts were published in literary and philosophical journals. Later, Silliman performed a chemical analysis of the rocks and published a revised report. The findings were discussed by notable scientific organizations in Philadelphia, London, and Paris. Still, there were skeptics about the idea of meteorites, including U.S. president Thomas Jefferson, who was said to have remarked, "It is easier to believe that two Yankee professors could lie than to admit that stones could fall from heaven."

Fun Fact: Silliman's and Kingsley's Weston meteorite fragments were the first cataloged items in the Yale meteorite collection, which is the oldest in the United States.

CINNAMON-RAISIN BISCUITS

Active Time: 25 mins Total Time: 50 mins Servings: 20

<u>Hardee's</u> <u>Cinnamon</u> <u>N' Raisin Biscuits.</u> First introduced in the 1980s,



the raisin-studded biscuits were beloved by loyal fans of the fast-food restaurant. What made these biscuits so special? Each one was buttery as any good biscuit should be, but they were swirled with cinnamon and dotted with juicy, tart raisins. Lastly, the baked biscuit was topped with a sweet, vanilla-y glaze that could better be described as a blanket of sugar, or a sweet hug of sugar, or just pure love.

Ingredients: for Cinnamon-Raisin Biscuits:

If you were planning to make biscuits for a weekend or holiday breakfast, you can add a few ingredients and make this recipe for cinnamon-raisin biscuits in-spired by Hardee's original instead. Here's what you'll need to get started:

Butter: The colder, the better, so freeze it if you have time.

Self-rising flour: This cut down on some ingredients and steps.

Granulated sugar: Add sweetness to the biscuit dough and makes them tender.

Ground cinnamon: Essential.

Raisins: Also, essential. These are named

cinnamon-raisin biscuits after all.

Whole buttermilk: Also important for the buttermilk to be cold cold cold.

Egg: You'll need one.

Water: This is used to create an easy egg wash for the top of the biscuits.

Powdered sugar: The primary ingredient for the biscuit's glaze.

Vanilla extract: Adds loads of warm vanilla flavor to the glaze. You could also use vanilla paste. In that case, you might need more buttermilk, but only a little bit.

How To Make Cinnamon-Raisin Biscuits

You need not be an experienced biscuit maker to try your hand at this recipe. While there are some classic biscuit-making steps (such as cutting in butter to make the dough), we've outlined the full recipe with images further down the page to make it as easy as possible. Here's just a quick overview:

Step 1. Prepare the butter: Grate that cold butter on a boxed grater. Keep it frosty in the freezer until time to use.

Step 2. Make the dough: Combine dry ingredients (flour, cinnamon, and sugar) in a bowl, then cut in the butter with a pastry cutter or knives until the mixture resembles pebbles. Then add the raisins and buttermilk, stirring until a shaggy dough forms.

Step 3. Roll out the dough: Lightly flour your work surface, then turn out the biscuit dough. Knead the dough until it comes together, then roll it into a rec-tangle. Cut the rectangle into fourths, stack the four pieces, and pat the dough back into a rectangle. (This is how the flaky layers are made.)

Step 4. Cut biscuits: Roll the dough out evenly, then grab a 2 1/2-inch cookie or biscuit butter (or a glass). Cut out 20 biscuits. Stack and pat out dough scraps as needed to get to 20. Put biscuits on a parchment paper-lined tray, then freeze them for 10 minutes.

Step 5. Add egg wash: Brush the tops of the biscuits with an egg-water wash, then bake about 15 minutes in a 425°F oven. Let cool slightly. (Repeat as needed with other trays of biscuits.)

Step 6. Make glaze: Combine remaining buttermilk, powdered sugar, and vanilla extract, and drizzle the glaze over warm biscuits


